

"The staff has helped me become more confident and have taught me new skills and shown me I can be successful. I realize now that there are so many adults who care about me, and it's okay to ask for help. I finally feel supported. I have a new view on life. I want to give back and help others."

After Perez graduates high school, she plans to attend college and work as a medical assistant or nurse. The night's second

Accelerator Project to Boost Rancho Cielo Programs

Rancho Cielo is set to expand its impact thanks to Uplift Central Coast. As one of 36 initiatives selected from a competitive pool of 136 proposals, Rancho Cielo will enhance its workforce development programs, ensuring local youth have greater access to career pathways in sustainable industries.

Uplift Central Coast, a regional partnership focused on economic resilience and equitable growth, has committed to early-stage project planning across six counties. This investment aims to drive long-term community benefits in job training, education and environmental sustainability.

For Rancho Cielo, the award represents an opportunity to accelerate its mission of empowering at-promise youth through hands-on learning and career preparation. Predevelopment assistance will allow for feasibility studies, assess expansion opportunities and refine its Ag Technology & Mechatronics, Welding & Fabrication and Auto &

Diesel Repair programs. "By investing in Rancho Cielo, we're not only strengthening the workforce pipeline but also creating sustainable economic opportunities for local youth," Bruce Stenslie, President and CEO of the Economic Development Collaborative, said. Rancho Cielo and its partners plan to work closely with Uplift Central Coast to implement strategic initiatives that drive meaningful changes in Monterey County and beyond.

Rancho Cielo Awards First-Ever RIDE Car Scholarships

In February 2025, Rancho Cielo (RC) marked a major milestone: three graduates—Isabel Patino, Anthony Trejo and Jesus Hernandez—became the first recipients of the RIDE (Rancho Invests in Driving Equity) Car Scholarship Award. This new initiative tackles one of the biggest obstacles students face—transportation—by helping them remove barriers.

At the award ceremony, RC leaders—including CEO Chris Devers, Founder Judge John Phillips, Equity Committee Chair Jamie Kitz and Board Member Don Chapin, Jr.—underscored a central message: lack of reliable transportation often stands

between students and their goals.

Addressing this challenge has been a natural evolution for RC, starting with a daily bus and van system that now transports nearly 100 students across a 225-mile round trip.

RC has also built strong partnerships to expand access. Collaborations with MST (Monterey-Salinas Transit) and the Monterey County Hospitality Association have made free bus passes available to students, and MST's new Route 40 now offers direct service to the campus. In 2023, RC launched a driver's education program with Drive Carmel to fill a gap left by traditional high schools. So far, 145 students have gone through the program, with over 115 earning permits and more than 70 securing licenses. RC covers DMV fees and provides rides, helping students gain mobility and, with it, independence.

The RIDE Car Scholarship, launched in 2024, is the latest step in this effort. Selected through a competitive process, the inaugural recipients earned more than just cars—they gained access to opportunity, momentum and a clearer path to success.

25 Years of Building Rancho: Sally Hughes Church Amphitheater

Rancho Cielo founder Judge John Phillips remembers it clearly: Rancho Cielo was once "nothing but an unsightly dumpsite."

In those early years, the school was more vision than reality. But it was a bold vision rooted in

giving young people purpose and hands-on opportunity. During a Board meeting, someone said, "We should have an amphitheater for these kids." The idea came with a price tag—roughly \$150,000—well beyond the program's early budget. But then a connection to the Salley Hughes Church Foundation led to funding.

"We had eight kids start on the project," Phillips says. "They were the most uninspired kids I had ever met. They didn't want to do anything, so I fired them. I told them I'd bring them back only if they promised to work hard." They did. And they returned with something to prove. That summer, they hauled base rock, poured concrete and worked alongside the Judge himself. By the end of the season, they had built more than a structure. They had built pride. The finished amphitheater, reminiscent of the Greek Theatre in Berkeley, features a proper stage and tiered seating with lighting for evening events. When the work was done, the students invited their families to a barbecue to show off what they had helped create.

Over a decade later, that same amphitheater held its largest audience yet. In 2024, around 600 people gathered there for Rancho Cielo's biggest graduating class in history.

"It started as a vision," Phillips reflects. "Now it's a place where young people celebrate their accomplishments. And they built it with their own hands."

Student Spotlight: Isaac Vargas

When Isaac Vargas wakes up in the morning, he looks forward to going to school—something he never imagined before starting at Rancho Cielo last fall. As a junior in the Auto & Diesel Repair program, he has discovered a passion for learning that once felt out of reach.

Before Rancho Cielo, Vargas attended two high schools in Salinas, where he often felt overwhelmed by the sheer number of students. "I didn't get much attention from the teachers," he explains. Without the support he needed, his enthusiasm for school faded. He began skipping class, falling behind, and getting into trouble.

"Rancho Cielo gives you a fresh new start," Vargas says. "There are so many opportunities here."

And he's making the most of every one. His instructors and case manager agree that his dedication is unmistakable—he rarely misses a day.

"He's always well-behaved and consistent with his learning," says Auto & Diesel Repair instructor Luis Ruiz. "He's a wellrounded kid—smart and dedicated to getting things done." Rather than focusing on one specialty, Vargas is eager to master every aspect of auto repair.

Recently, he replaced the fuel tank in his 1991 Ford F350, a hands-on experience that reinforced his goals. Now 17, Vargas has a clear vision for his future: after high school, he plans to become a full-time mechanic.

Before Cynthia Cuevas came to Rancho Cielo, welding wasn't even on her radar. In fact, she had never heard of it. But everything changed the day she struck her first arc.

"After completing my first practice weld, I knew I wanted to do this," she says.

At 19, Cuevas enrolled at Rancho Cielo with a simple goal: finish her high school credits. Her newfound love for welding ignited her academic motivation. She not only completed her coursework but proudly graduated in 2024. Along the way, she transformed. "I saw her confidence spike big time," says her case manager, Maria Alvarado. "She came in as a quiet and shy student and graduated as a class leader."

For Cuevas, Rancho Cielo is more than just a place to learn—it's a community that uplifted her.

"I believe everyone here is family," she says.

"Everyone is happy to see me whenever I walk in. Maria and Angel remind me of that every time I'm here." Now, with welding as her craft and Rancho Cielo as her foundation, Cuevas is ready to forge a future built on strength, skill and determination.
